"Some Rides Are Filled with Bull..."

The day was cloudy, with low lying fog. However, not riding was not an option. Traveling several hundred miles (approximately 4-hours of riding) was not going to be out done by the potential perils of nature. The morning started out with a good night's sleep, coupled with a great breakfast. (Note: It was a buffet breakfast, thus taking portions to the room, for consumption while riding was frowned on by management.)

The purpose of this article is to reinforce the importance of always riding defensively, using one's mirrors to assure safety, and always being aware of potential road hazards that can create a bull of a mess, with just one pile.

Rider Education

Medic First Aid Basic CPR and First Aid training programs are required to advance from Level II through Level IV, within the GWRRA's Rider Education program. The goal of the program is to help one gain the knowledge, skills, and confidence necessary to manage a medial emergency until more advanced help is available.

Emergency first aid does not require one to make complex decisions or have in-depth medical knowledge, but establish you as an important part of a tem of emergency medical care providers that includes fire-fighters, EMTs, paramedics, hospital emergency room personnel and others.

- The program will focus on one's essential responsibilities as a first aid provider allowing for the following:
- Recognizing a medical emergency
- Making the decision to help
- Identifying hazards and ensuring personal safety
- Activating the Emergency Medical Services (EMS)
- Providing supportive basic first aid care

The popularity of motorcycling has increased in the last few years; more than 1.1 million motorcycles were sold in 2006, according to the Motorcycle Industry Council. The popularity of this pastime has resulted in an increasing in motorcyclist deaths in recent years, more than doubling between the all-time low in 1997 and 2005. In 2006 4,810 motorcyclists were killed, up 5.6% from the 4,553 motorcyclist fatalities in 2005. In addition, 88,000 motorcyclists were injured in traffic crashes in 2006. Motorcycle rider fatalities accounted for 1 percent of total 2006 fatalities, exceeding the number of pedestrian fatalities for the first time since the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration began collecting fatal motor vehicle crash data in 1975.

To reduce the percentage of deaths and injuries from motorcycle crashes, the federal government and many states have established safety programs. These programs address the importance of using helmets, licensing correctly, educating riders, and avoiding alcohol, when riding. Rider Education (cont)

Being certified and skilled in First Aid and carrying the basic first aid kit on your bike allows the necessary assistance to those riders who have encountered riding opportunities.

One last note of interest would be the essentials of a first aid kit, which should be checked at least twice a year to ensure the integrity of the products and equipment.

- Surgical gloves
- Saline Solution
- Bandage Material
- Pocket Mask
- Trauma Shears
- Triangular Bandages
- Cold Pack Compress
- Trauma Dressing
- Kling
- Medical Tape
- Water
